Why We Need to Close the Healthcare Coverage Gap



In South Carolina, 400,000 adults 19-64 have no health insurance.

- 79% of SC small businesses more than any state except Alaska don't offer it
- Among the one-quarter of workers nationwide with the lowest wages, almost 2/3 aren't eligible for their employer insurance²
- Many low income workers don't qualify for the exchange

Can SC Afford to Cover More Adults? Yes!

- **340,000 South Carolinians** would gain access to affordable health coverage if we expand Medicaid³
- SC would only invest 10% of the total cost (\$356 million in FY28), 2-3% of the state-funded budget
- The SC investment would bring the 90% federal match a net \$7.2 billion in the first 3 years. Additionally, SC would get a \$904 million Federal bonus in 2026 and 2027 covering almost the first 3 years of the state's cost
- The experience of other states shows the new tax revenue from economic growth and savings in state programs largely offsets the state's long term cost⁴

Medicaid Today

- Only covers parents earning less than \$17,299 (3 person family)
- (pregnant and post-partum women have higher income eligibility)

Medicaid Expansion


- Covers parents earning less than \$35,632 (3 person family)
- Also covers all adults earning less than \$20,783 (single adult).

Don't Let SC Be Left Behind

40 states and DC have already closed the gap

If South Carolina does not close the healthcare gap, we lose **\$28 BILLION** in federal funds over 10 years to other states





Most people on Medicaid in the US work, and work hard. Data from the Census Bureau's American Community Survey:

- 61% of adults insured through Medicaid are employed, many in essential jobs. 6% are in school or training
- 13% of those insured are caring for children, family, or other dependents full-time
- 11% are either too ill or have a disability preventing them from work
- 9% do not work for other reasons, such as retirement (20% of those benefiting from closing the gap in SC are 55-64) or inability to find work or transportation
